John McCormick(p 57, 138) made clothing for thirty nine men from the 272 separate accounts in Journal SM41 M. Making a single coat cost the buyers eight shillings, about \$1.04. He probably traveled with a horse and buggy, (countered by a complete lack of analy feed or shoeing charges) and may have on the floor or in his wagon received board and a bed/by the fireplace. His steady framexparx meat purchases suggest that he lived nearby. His June potatoe purchase suggests the end of hiseway own crop, or a payment of board to a neighbor. Since he sold 22 pounds of mutton to Hopewell at 3½ pence a pound, he may have raided a shhep, or may have tailored by barter.

He used tobacco and xx whiskey moderately, except for the purchase of $2\frac{1}{2}$ gallon at the end of December at 4 S a gallon, about .52. This purchase may have been MAYHAUE BEEN a bargain or he was "stocking" for future needs.

He drew cash twice; on one occassion 4.10.0, about \$12. He evidentily liked mackeral since he bought ten of 19 in less than a month. His eight beef purchase half-price (defective in looks) totalled 69½ pounds. He felt affluent enough to buy a/Hopewell 10 plate stove miximifxprime for 3.10.0, about \$9.30., and a Dutch Bake oven for 18/9., abt \$2.43 If man did not buy tailoring materials from the Hopewell store, or did NOT like the variety presented, McCormick probably supplied them from Reading merchant Dundass, or local merchant John Gray, spending \$78.20 over half m 29.8.2 out of his total earnings of 51.17.8 1.2, (about \$137.95).

charging) McCormick 15 S for his brother James' and 7.6.5.(about \$19.45) for NEEDS.

his own, Purchased separately for McCormick's use by John was an air baloon

waist coat pattern at 7/6(.91), shamery linen for britches, 9/7, abt\$1.25, and

two dozen buttons at 2/6, about .30.

At the <u>Journal</u>'s end, McCormick had earned 51.17.82 but owed Mark Bird 11.82 about **** \$1.50. But repail the cash drawn as well as the stove purchase.
