DUMP NEVER LOCATED

while it is surmised that the fill over the VAULTED tailrace was used as a dump- Abel found about EIGHT FEET of burned moulding sand there— this area has NOT been explored fully. Likewise, the now-exposed MAIN WALL G, when broken, china- trash dumped back of the wall as it was filled, came Wall J Mymmis about three feet back of Wall G. to our attention. The same applies to the curved wall north of the flume beginning, when needing repairs- trash- the legitmate From the Big House TRASH BARREL- went back of then new walls as fill.

HOWEVER, the dump from the furnace, the INWALL LININGS, replaced on the average every year-habe NOT BEEN LOCATED.

This BURNED-GLAZED sandstone

would be easily recognizable. In excavating the south wall of the south
side of the Cast House, several pieces of such BURNED inwall were found. S
