Meatwise, he bought 21½ pounds of bacon( mark of a collier), 190 3/4 of porkand 195¼ of beef. This abraged over 1.1. pounds daily for the entire year of 17 84. His flour purchases,  $56\frac{1}{2}$  quarters(28#)/mm white flour

42 of rye and 196# of cornmeal. This bread source averaged 4.32 pounds-Loaves daily for the entire year also, suggesting children in the family. O Hay also liked mackeral, purchasinf 6, 7 and 8 at a time, and totaling 49, almost for 4.5.0, abt \$11.29.
